WEATHERFORD, Okla. (KOKH) — A Weatherford Police Department detective turned himself in after an investigation by the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI) indicated he had been stealing drugs from the evidence room of the police department.

Weatherford Police Detective Jeremy Anderson turned himself into the Custer County Sheriff's Department for one charge of Larceny of Controlled Dangerous Substances, a felony, and/or one charge of a Public Officer's Willful Neglect to Perform their Duty, a misdemeanor.

OSBI began their investigation in Sept. 9, 2021, after a substantial quantity of drugs, namely Fentanyl, was discovered missing from the evidence room of the Weatherford Police Department.

After a lengthy investigation, the case was presented to the Oklahoma Multi-County Grand Jury on April 12, 2022, where indictments for both charges were handed down by the Grand Jury and were filed on Tuesday, April 19 in the District Court of Custer County.

Anderson was released after posting a \$10,000 bond.
