1/9/2023	0230 aprx	Trooper Greene contacted me at the office. He expressed some concerns regarding what he believed to be a bad search by another trooper. He explained that Trooper Thomas had backed him up on a traffic stop and eventually agreed to wait for the impound tow. After leaving the scene, Trooper Greene was called by Trooper Thomas and advised that a baggy of Xanax pills had been found in the locked glovebox. They determined that the suspect did not have a prescription for the pills so they were confiscated for destruction as they were contraband. Trooper Greene suggested that I look into the incident as there had not been consent or a warrant allowing for the search of the glovebox. At the time my only concern was an illegal search by Trooper Thomas which I believed could be remedied by counseling/retraining. I did suggest to Trooper Greene, that given his respected status, that his saying something to Trooper Thomas would be more impactful. I would still follow up with Trooper Thomas. Trooper Greene took that on and he later advised me he had discussed the matter with Trooper Thomas. At the time I did not make this a priority as I had other more pressing matters. Additionally I did not think this was going to amount to nothing more than an opportunity to counsel Trooper Thomas on better performance and documenting that counseling.
1/13 or 1/14 2023		Around this time Trooper Greene contacted me regarding Trooper Thomas' narrative report for this incident. He expressed that the initial report was poor and he had encouraged Trooper Thomas to write a more detailed report about how the pills were obtained. He shared his concern that he believed Trooper Thomas' narrative had painted him (Trooper Greene) in a bad light. As he described it he felt he had been thrown under the bus. I told him that I had not yet reviewed the video and that with Trooper Thomas on vacation, I was not making it a top line priority. I expected to discuss the matter with Trooper Thomas when he returned from vacation around the 27th. I further advised I would add it to the things I would look at and if warranted I would address it with Trooper Thomas. I asked him to provide me the case number so that I could more easily find the reports. He sent me the information via email. The case number is #23-000458. Adding poor report writing to the discussion did not change my plans with regard to counseling and documentation.
1/20/2023	1800ish	I reviewed Trooper Thomas narrative report which was found in CITE. In it he wrote, <i>"I checked the glove box (which had been locked) and noticed a baggie containing a large amount of pills which I recognized to be Xanax. I stepped back and informed Trooper Greene about the pills...I was reminded</i>

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		<i>later that night I shouldn't have opened the glove box since it was locked. Apparently it had been so long since I had done an inventory for a tow where the glovebox or center console weren't open as some point, I forgot I shouldn't have checked it without other circumstances present."</i> The acknowledgment of the opening the locked glovebox was concerning. Not opening locked containers without a warrant or consent has been a basic training item at the academy since I was in the academy in 1996. Further, having to enter into the car without a warrant, even for an inventory, has not been best practice given case law for several years now. Given the number of cars he has impounded and warrants he has written, I was perplexed as to how any of this escaped him. There were no articulable facts in his report that would raise any suspicions about the possible presence of contraband in the car. So why the need to open a locked glovebox? Additionally, at first blush, his explanation for the oversight felt disingenuous. My first thought was that he knows better and is well aware of the basic rules of searching/inventorying cars – he is an FTO after all – and that he impounds cars on a regular basis. While all of this is concerning I was still leaning toward counseling, re-training and definitely documenting it on an O-95. I then watched the video of the incident. His arrival to the scene (2304 hours) and conversation with the suspect about a DRE evaluation are captured on the video. Trooper Greene's departure is on the video. Between Trooper Greene's departure and the start of the inventory, Trooper Thomas is talking to someone who is not identified, though it sounds like it might be another police officer. My impression was that the officer left prior to the inventory beginning. After several minutes, Trooper Thomas begins the inventory, which is done by looking through the windows, as he should be doing it. He takes pictures of the car as is expected. He then walks back to his car and the video ends about one minute later (2341 hours). Opening the car or the glovebox is not recorded. The phone call to Trooper Greene is not recorded on Trooper Thomas' video either. All of this is recounted in his narrative report. There is no obvious reason as to why the video was turned off. The tow is not at the scene. He is not leaving (which is confirmed with his narrative report). The only conclusion I can come to is that he knows he is about to be doing something he should not be doing so he stops the recording.

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		Turning off the camera is a policy violation and it appears to have occurred to hide the fact that another policy was about to be violated. <i>At this point I began debating completing a case log and draft IIR for Lieutenant Brandon.</i>
1/22/2023	1400	I spoke with Sergeant Betts to get another take on my dilemma. During that conversation the topic of being "Brady'd" was brought up. At that moment I decide this was too serious for me to handle with counseling/retraining, without at least first advising the district command staff. I decided I would be doing a case log and IIR when I went to work.
	1424	I telephoned Lieutenant Brandon and advised him of the details, my concerns and my plan to forward a case log to him.
1/22/2023	1955	I checked to see if Trooper Greene's video was available. It is not. He advised his hard drive was turned in on the 15th. It is not in the drop box at the Burlington office, so it might be at the district waiting to be uploaded.
	2000	I advised Trooper Greene that I would no longer be discussing this case with him and suggested that he refrain from discussing it with others as well.
		I have attached narrative reports from Trooper Greene and Trooper Thomas, along with my case log and draft IIR. <i>Pertinent Regulations</i> 1.02.010 Searches (I.C.1.f) – Inventory of Seized Vehicle or Other Property (locked containers within). 18.00.150 Mobile In-Car Video System (III.E.3.d)– Recording Obligations (required to stay on until end of contact). 8.00.150 Truthfulness (A.2) Providing Information (justification that search was mistake due to unfamiliarity with laws, regulations and training pertaining to inventorying cars). <i>Follow up items</i> Review Trooper Greene's video of the incident. I suspect the phone conversation between Trooper Greene and Trooper Thomas can be heard on Trooper Greene's recording (sometime after 2340 hours). <i>Potential Exculpatory Questions</i> Possible follow up item: Is the original report from Trooper Thomas

At approximately 2300, I was on routine patrol in Skagit County, WA. I was on an unrelated traffic stop when I heard Trooper J. Greene #536 ask for a ten minute status. I know this comment from Trooper Greene usually means one of two things is happening so I elected to head his way once I cleared my own traffic stop.

I stopped on scene of his traffic stop at eastbound State Route 20 near Avon Allen Road. I observed Trooper Greene stopped behind a blue Dodge Charger bearing the Washington registration CDP4497. I could see Trooper Greene was performing SFSTs on who I assumed was the driver as there was no one else in the car. I stood back in a position where I could observe traffic, the driver, and the surrounding area and performed the duties related to being a cover officer. I was looking for safety things Trooper Greene might not notice. I observed Trooper Greene give the directions for Modified Romberg and noticed the driver had moved so he was standing sort of shoulder to shoulder with him and then move back. Outside of that, I wasn't close enough to any independent observations of the driver. A short time later, Trooper Greene placed the driver under arrest for DUI.

I stood by Trooper Greene as he searched the driver, identified as ESTES, KYLE SCOTT 09-27-1997. I noticed while they talked Estes speech was slurred and slow. He also seemed to be moving slowly. Trooper Greene asked Estes about performing the DRE evaluation and Estes seemed to be confused about what was being asked so it was turned over to me to talk him about it.

I stood with Estes at the back of the patrol vehicle while he sitting in the car. I didn't notice any odors coming from the car. I noticed Estes had a slack, pale face and his eyelids were droopy. I explained to him the evaluation after having a casual conversation about the night. Estes had been with a lady friend and he had taken her home and was on his way back to Sultan. He had gotten lost and was trying to get back home. This struck me as funny as when I retrieved his phone at his request, the GPS on and giving directions. I explained to him the evaluation and he was unsure about it. I told him he could have some time to mull it over and if he wanted to, he just had to let Trooper Greene know. A short time later I was advised he had declined the evaluation.

Estes had been asked if there was someone local who could come and get the car. He advised everyone he knew was in Sultan and had no one who could get here. I asked about the lady friend and he didn't want to disturb her since she had kids. As a result the vehicle was impounded by Carl's Towing with a 12 hour hold. I performed an inventory of the vehicle and besides several tools, what appeared to be car items, and clothing; there was a bong in the center console. I checked the glove box (which had been locked) and noticed a baggie containing a large amount of pills which I recognized to be Xanax. I stepped back and informed Trooper Greene about the pills and had him inform the driver if he didn't have a prescription he couldn't possess them and with his permission they would be destroyed. He advised them to destroy them. They were taken and later entered for destruction.

I was reminded later that night I shouldn't have opened the glove box since it was locked. Apparently it had been so long since I had done an inventory for a tow where the glove box or center console weren't open at some point, I forgot I shouldn't have checked it without other circumstances present.

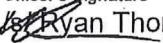

NARRATIVE

On January 8, 2023 I was on patrol in Skagit County WA. As I traveled west on State Route 20 just east of Higgins Airport Road, I observed a black Dodge Charger pass my location eastbound. I observed the Dodge did not have a functioning headlight. I turned on the vehicle at Higgins Airport Road and caught up to it at Avon Allen Road. I observed it was a black 2006 Dodge Charger bearing Washington Registration CDP4497. I subsequently activated my emergency overhead lights and initiated a traffic stop at 2248 hours.

Upon stopping I made contact with the male driver and lone occupant. I could immediately smell a strong odor of marijuana emanating from within the Dodge. I know this odor based on my training and experience as a law enforcement officer. I identified myself and advised the driver the traffic stop was being audio and video recorded. I also explained the reason for the stop. The driver had his Washington Driver's License in his hand and provided it to me. He also provided me with his social security card. Using the Washington License I identified him as Kyle S. Estes (DOB 9-27-97). I asked for the registration and as Estes began to look.

I began to make small talk with Estes about where he was coming from. He advised he had dropped a friend off. Estes provided me with his registration. He also advised his insurance carrier was Brooks.

I could see that Estes had dilated pupils, along with bloodshot and watery eyes. I noted Estes had a flat affect and a blank gaze. I know these can be common signs and symptoms of controlled substance use.

I asked Estes to exit the vehicle and speak with me. I could still smell marijuana on his person once he was out of the vehicle. I advised Estes I had asked him out of the vehicle because I could smell the heavy odor in the vehicle. Estes advised his friend had a dab pen. I know based on my training and experience that dab is slang for marijuana concentrates. I also know dab pens are E-style cigarettes that have a marijuana concentrate in them. Estes indicated he had used the pen way earlier in the day. I asked specifically how long ago. Estes advised approximately four hours ago. I asked how often he smoked. He stated not very often.

I asked if he had any problems with his eyes. Estes stated he did not. I asked if he wore contact lenses or glasses. Estes eventually indicated he thought he had an astigmatism. I asked if he had any physical disabilities. Estes advised he did not. I asked when he had last smoked marijuana. Estes advised he had not smoked but had took hits off of a dab pen. Estes denied knowing what he had smoked and ultimately claimed it was really strong tobacco. I asked if there was anything mechanically wrong with the charger. Estes advised there was not. I asked Estes if he would be willing to perform some voluntary field sobriety tests to make sure he was alright to drive. Estes agreed to perform the tests.

The field sobriety tests were performed on the paved shoulder, which was level. All overhead lights were left on, however Estes was faced away from them when practical. No marked line was used for the walk and turn testing.

Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus: 0 of 6 clues
No horizontal gaze nystagmus was observed.

Walk and Turn: 4 of 8 clues
During the instruction stage of testing Estes started before instructed to do so. During the first series of nine steps Estes missed his heel to toe on every step by approximately 3 inches. He performed the turn improperly and simply turned once he reached the end. On the return series of nine steps Estes staggered at step 3 and I felt he may stop. I ended the test due to safety concerns.

One Leg Stand: 0 of 4 clues
I observed no errors when Estes performed the test.

Romberg Balance:
During the test Estes estimated the passage of 30 seconds in 31 actual seconds. He used 1 thousands to count to 30. During the test he had severe body tremors and eyelid tremors. These are common signs and symptoms of cannabis consumption.

Finger to Nose:
Left – placed the pad of the finger on the left nostril.
Right – proper placement
Left – placed the pad of the finger on the left nostril.
Right – placed the tip of the finger on the right nostril.
Right – proper placement
Left – placed the pad of the finger on the left nostril.

Upon completing the test I placed Estes under arrest due to his obvious impairment at 2302 hours. Estes was placed into handcuffs and indicated he needed to use the restroom. I verified a number one or two. Estes advised it was a bowel movement. Estes was searched incident to arrest and placed into the rear of the patrol car. He was advised of his Constitutional Rights and the waiver from my department issued card. Estes was disputing that he was DUI. I eventually advised him if he didn't want to speak with me or answer a question to advise me. I also advised him of his citizenship notification from my department issued card.

Estes was subsequently asked if he wanted to do a drug recognition evaluation. Estes ultimately denied a DRE evaluation. Estes was transported to Burlington P.D. to use the restroom. Trooper R. Thomas (549) stood by for a tow, as no reasonable alternative was available.

At 2334 Estes was advised of his Constitutional Rights and the waiver from the DOL packet.

At 2337 Estes was advised of the voluntary blood draw consent form. Estes denied a permissive blood draw.

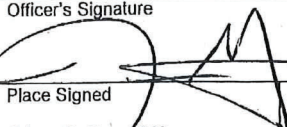
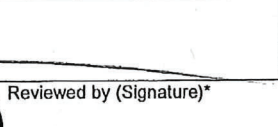
I began to compose a warrant for Estes blood, as he had one prior DUI within the last ten years. While doing so Trooper Thomas contacted me. He advised he had opened the locked glove box of the Dodge and found Xanax pills. Estes was advised he would not be charged for the pills and they would be destroyed.

I subsequently applied for a warrant for Estes blood. On 1-9-23 at 0012 hours Skagit County Commissioner Patrick A. Eason approved the warrant.

Estes was transported to Skagit Valley Hospital. When in the lobby placing on masks, Estes had poor finger dexterity and struggled to get a mask from the box. At 0035 hours Skagit County Phlebotomist Diarius Windless drew two gray topped vials of Estes blood from the right arm at the crook of the elbow. The area was sterilized with Iodine. I also observed the entire blood draw. Both vials were within expiration and contained a white anti-coagulant powder.

It should be noted that the times on the search warrant were not correct. I used the clock in the exam room which was set one hour fast.

Estes had a prior DUI so he was transported to the jail and booked. All evidence was entered into the WSP Evidence system under case number 23-000458 01/02.
